

Network Optimization

Just as with everything else in our lives, freight matching and freight analytics has continued to become more and more complex, requiring sophisticated calculations that can only be completed by computers. Recently Brian Gibala, Vice President of Sales, and I had the honor of going to a freight management workshop with other carriers, hosted by Truckload Wizard. You may not have heard of Truckload Wizard, but they have been a pioneer in the freight analytics business for over 35 years and have represented some of the largest carriers in the nation during that time. Truckload Wizard is to Transportation what Billy Beane is to Major League Baseball. If you don't know who that is, it is Brad Pitt's character in *Moneyball* (2011).

While at the workshop, we analyzed our freight and markets, reviewed tools available to LTI to make us all more successful, and shared ideas with other carriers to learn better ways to improve our procedures and make LTI a better company. This workshop was very beneficial as it is always valuable to have an unbiased, outside set of eyes review your network and tell you what they see is working and not working, and show you the data to support their position.

While interacting with other carriers, it is always interesting to discuss how they complete their core tasks. It doesn't matter if you have 100 trucks, 1,000 trucks, or even 5,000 trucks—most of the tasks are still completed very similarly

as we all routinely look at the same metrics. attend the same meetings, and deal with the same issues; larger companies simply deal with them on a larger scale. After speaking with larger carriers, I do believe that LTI has the advantage of being more flexible and is able to work quicker to solve our drivers' issues or concerns than some larger carriers.

Ignoring fatigue can impair your judgment and reaction time, leading to poor decision-making while driving.

As a truck driver, it's crucial to pay attention and slow down when passing through construction areas. Abide by the posted speed limits and be aware of any changes in traffic patterns. In the month of June, we had the opportunity to test this technology. The revenue gained was 3% of our overall revenue and resulted in 8% average margin made per load. With further work, we plan to take this to the next level with load count, market share, revenue, and margin for both our logistics and assets.

Also, our Maintenance Department has now increased their staffing to accommodate 24/7 breakdown assistance in-house (see next page).

Rather, it relies on each of us doing our part to make sure that we are available to our team members, whether you work in the office, in a truck out on the road,

We have been working on ways to keep our drivers moving longer with less breakdowns and faster response times, and are thrilled to announce the following changes.

24 Hour Breakdowns:

In the past, we have used TTN Fleet Solutions to assist the department with after hours breakdowns. We are now staffed to handle breakdowns 24/7 and will no longer utilize TTN for after hours calls. This is a major accomplishment for our department. Having LTI personnel accessible to our drivers directly will result in a better breakdown experience for our fleet – saving money and boosting uptime.

New Team Members:

Cassie Norris is our Maintenance Coordinator. Cassie oversees the Breakdown Administrators and truck cleaning crew, and handles driver services. She is the main shop contact for drivers and truck assignments.

Courtney Butcher has joined the Maintenance Department from Operations. Courtney will join Mike Rosso on day shift as a Breakdown Administrator. Courtney handles all breakdowns that occur over the road. Courtney and Mike will cover day shift breakdowns 7 days a week with rotating shifts.

Jerad Burch has been promoted to Maintenance Compliance Manager. Jerad is the point of contact for equipment instruction and driver protocol. Jerad will work to track driver idle time and fuel usage, truck recoveries, and pre-trip/post-trip compliance.

Marilyn Yates is our 2nd shift Breakdown Administrator. Marilyn is responsible for all local and over the road breakdowns.

Darek Sellers and Kenny Stricklin are our 3rd shift Breakdown Administrators. Darek and Kenny will be on call for any breakdowns that occur on the road overnight.

Health & Wellness: How Nutrition Impacts the Brain

How Well Do We Comply?

As my new role as Maintenance Compliance Manager takes shape, I will be overseeing driver idle time, fuel efficiency, and shop compliance according to OSHA and EPA regulations. I believe we, as a collective group, have much work to do to improve what we can, when we can.

For drivers, this includes properly setting and running your APU to cut down on wasted fuel. Yes, we do have parameters in place so the truck can idle when the outside temperature is above 85 or below 20, but that does not always mean that you should let it just idle your truck. You can still set Optimized Idle and let your APU do most of the work. As a company, this is a major component of lost revenue that we can improve on. It's important that we each do our part in running the APU as much as possible.

A major component of the Maintenance Compliance Manager role involves driver use of equipment. This includes the interior and exterior

of the truck and trailer. How well do you, as a professional driver, do a pretrip and post-trip? These 2 steps, when done well, can help you prevent unnecessary breakdowns on the road. Do you Get Out And Look (GOAL) before backing under every trailer to make sure you do not miss the kingpin of the trailer? Do you ease back into the trailer to hook up? If a DOT Officer looks inside your truck, will they be satisfied with what they see? These are just a few questions to keep in mind as you, a professional driver, get to your next load.

Another part of my new role is shop compliance, which includes ensuring that procedures are set and followed for safety and efficiency for all our drivers and personnel. To that end, going forward we ask that all drivers who need assistance check in at the shop office. We've recently upgraded the shop office—if you haven't seen it, come stop by and check it out for yourself!

I look forward to this new role as we

make improvements that are needed and expected. We can all make small steps together to make a big impact. Thank you, drivers, for all that you do. Your job is not an easy one.

Drivers, Are You Receiving Your Settlements?

Every Thursday night, LTI's Weekly Update Emails are sent out to our entire fleet of drivers, which includes important information, most notably, that week's settlement which breaks down your loads, miles, earnings, and deductions for that week's work.

We've increasingly heard from drivers that they are not receiving their Weekly Update Emails. In actuality, what is happening is that for some recipients, they are getting blocked up by the recipient's email server (Gmail, Yahoo, etc.).

If you do not see yours, make sure you check your junk or spam folder. The emails come from LTIUpdates@ltitrucking.com with

the subject line "Your LTI Weekly Update". Once you locate an email, you should mark it "Not Spam", which may prevent future emails from being blocked. Also, adding LTIUpdates@ltitrucking.com to your contact list or safe sender list is the best way to prevent future emails from being blocked. You will then be able to receive your settlements each week uninterrupted.

While checking your spam should be your first step in locating missing settlements, you are always welcome to reach out to the Payroll Team with any questions or issues via the Pay Inquiry Samsara document.
